We also extend our deepest gratitude to all the wonderful volunteers who came out to help — too many to list. We couldn't have done it without you!!





After piloting the Nor'wester Readers program (2007-2008) at Hillcrest Elementary in Kim Rinella's second grade resource room, Wes then worked a year at Goodnoe Elementary before migrating to Richboro Elementary and Carla Foy's class. This is where he teamed with Wendi's son, Blake, who volunteered during his junior and senior years in high school. When Blake went off to college, Wendi took over the other end of the

leash and has worked with hundreds of Richboro Elementary children. When Wendi announced that this was the last school year Wes would be visiting, the staff and students of Richboro Elementary planned a fundraiser for the week of April 20-24 which culminated in a PUP-Rally and a Retirement Paw-ty for Wes on Friday afternoon.

The entire student body, along with therapy dog teams from NWR, many who were Wes sons and daughters, gathered in the auditorium for several slide shows, speeches, and the presentation of a check for \$535, the amount raised by the school during the week. All the students then walked outside to the school playground where Wes was presented with a farewell basket of goodies.

BUBBA COMPLETES ANOTHER YEAR OF READING THERAPY!

Bubba is a 7 year old Golden Retriever who helps with reading programs for 3rd graders. His primary job is to listen intently to the students when they read their books or compositions.

Teachers find creative ways to use Bubba to build their students' skills. In September, I was asked to photograph Bubba in various poses and situations such as Bubba:

Wearing a baseball cap Opening a present At the beach



The photos were used in two ways. First, the pictures were loaded into a computer-driven Smart Board that was used for student lessons. Bubba would appear in the corner of the board. The Bubba picture would correspond to the type of lesson being given-e.g. math, spelling, etc. Bubba would only visit the students one hour a week. However, the students were reminded of Bubba throughout the week via the Smart Board.

The photos were also used by the teacher to encourage the students to write adventure stories about Bubba--- Bubba goes to the beach. Bubba attends a baseball game.

At the end of the school year, Bubba was given adventure books written by the students, thank you cards and a special leash signed by all the students.

Bubba provided to some of the students a miniature version of a Golden Retriever with the message "Study with Me" inscribed on the dog tag. Bubba hopes this remembrance will urge them to study over the summer and prepare them for the upcoming school year.

Bubba looks forward to returning this fall to continue helping 3rd graders build their reading and writing skills.

MEET NAN AND BOB MUSKA

Nor'wester Readers husband and wife team of Nan and Bob Muska have worked a combined total of eleven years in Council Rock classrooms with their dogs Jillian and Sadie.

Both Nan and Bob are natives of Northeast Philadelphia and moved to Southampton in 1966 where they raised their four children.

Bob worked for various engineering companies throughout Philadelphia as a designer of mechanical systems for numerous buildings and structures in the area. He was employed for 18 years by the engineering company Bennett Levin and Associates and served as their Vice President. Thereafter he worked with several mechanical contractors as a project manager. Bob reminisces about the days when there were no computers and all mechanical systems designs were drafted by hand. He retired in 2008 after 45 years in the business.

Nan pursued her education degree at West Chester State College. After several years of teaching she became a stay-at home mom. Later she pursued her Masters in Education degree at Temple University. She worked as a reading specialist and branched out into training as a therapeutic bodyworker. Nan

continues, today, to work as a bodyworker in several modalities: foot and face reflexology and Watsu, aquatic bodywork which incorporates shiatsu.

Nan always had dogs growing up, but Bob didn't until he married Nan. Their current dogs are Jillian, Sadie, and Penny. Jillian and Penny both came to them via The Seeing Eye, and Sadie came from a Labrador Retriever breeder. All three dogs are registered therapy dogs. Jillian and Sadie have been working with multiple disabilities classes and special needs students. Penny, at age 2, has just recently passed her tests and is working at the Free Library of Northampton Township in this summer's "Read To The Dogs" program. All three dogs also work on Saturdays at the Barrett Paradise Friendly Library in Cresco, PA in their "Tales to Tails" program.

Nan always knew she wanted to do therapy dog work. She and Jillian began working with Roxy Reading in the Central Bucks School District as well as piloting the canine hospice program at Holy Redeemer Hospital for two years. She transitioned to Nor'wester Readers because our program was situated in schools much closer to their home. Bob had no plans to do therapy dog work and certified with Jillian "just for the fun of it." But when Nan needed bi-lateral knee replacements, Bob was finally convinced to serve as Nan's substitute in Tara Handfinger's third grade class at Churchville Elementary in Council Rock School District. Bob finished the year and loved it so much he decided to come on board with Nor'wester Readers as a full time volunteer.

Nan then transitioned into volunteering with Multiple Disabilities classes, both on the elementary and high school level as well as in a Life Skills class at Richboro Middle School. In addition to his regular education class, Bob has regularly volunteered during the summer at the Free Library of Northampton Township and two years at Camp Expressions, a camp for children who are on the autism spectrum.

When asked why he continues to do therapy dog work in the schools Bob said, "I love the kids, and I love seeing the progress they make by the side of a therapy dog. It is gratifying to feel like I am helping to make a difference." Nan shared, "I started my journey with therapy dog work because Jillian had been born to be of service to humans as a Seeing Eye Dog. When she came to me after waiting so long to get her (3 years), I felt with my experiences in hospice work that we could be a good team. I had no idea what would be in store for us. The journey has offered hard work, joy and sadness, new experiences, new friendships, new challenges, and, of course, the addition of two more wonderful dogs, Sadie (every one just LOVES her) and Penny (a work in progress). I look forward to each class and the unexpected joy it will bring to my heart."

THERE'S A DOG IN MY CLASSROOM!

On Friday, February 13, 2015, Nor'wester Readers presented a three hour workshop "*There's A Dog in My Classroom!*" as part of the district-wide "Deep Smarts" in-service day held at Council Rock High School - South. Facilitators of the workshop were Lyn Bauer (retired reading specialist), Lynn Lenz (retired special education teacher), Debbie Glessner (NWR Director and retired library-media coordinator), Wendi Huttner (NWR Director and Labrador Retriever breeder), Carol Wagner (NWR therapy dog handler), and Hannah, our canine ambassador.

The workshop addressed the role of therapy dogs in the educational environment and how they can be used effectively to improve the power of creative teaching strategies to develop a child's confidence, motivation, and success as a learner. In addition, teachers had the opportunity to dialog with experienced therapy dog host teachers and brainstorm teaching strategies with their colleagues as they worked together to develop exciting and motivational activities centered around their therapy dog team.

Twenty-eight teachers were in attendance. Ten were currently hosting therapy dogs and the remainder were teachers who someday hope to have a canine partner in their classroom. Discussion was lively, and many questions were answered by the facilitators. It was a delightful workshop, and everyone agreed that it was fun "going to the dogs!"

RAVE REVIEWS FOR JON KATZ!

On Sunday, March 15th, Nor'wester Readers proudly hosted NY Times best selling author, *Jon Katz*, who presented a program titled "*What Animals Mean to Us*" at Council Rock's Richboro Middle School auditorium. BEHIND THE SCENES



- ** "Mr. Nelson and Bubba are an amazing team. Mr. Nelson really took the time to get to know each and every child. They were sensitive to my students' emotional and learning needs. He was always willing to ask for suggestions and if he should be doing anything different. Bubba got really comfortable with my students and by the end would snuggle up next to each of them. My students were more eager to write when I asked Mr. Nelson to take pictures of Bubba doing various different things around the house. The students also were motivated to learn their sight words because they wanted to work their way up to reading a book to Bubba. The amount of social skills they practiced with Bubba and Mr. Nelson was also very helpful. The interactions and taking turns is very important. My classroom is not easy because their functional academic levels range from pre-primer (not even on Kindergarten level) to some of my students reading at a 6th grade level. I cannot say enough good things about how Mr. Nelson and Bubba were with my students. I can tell each of my students will always remember their time spent with Mr. Nelson and Bubba." - ** "I have a very wide range of learners in my 5th grade classroom. The students who struggle in reading felt extremely comfortable reading to Obie and Miss Lynne. Having a therapy dog really helped boost their confidence when it came to oral fluency. However, I felt that ALL students benefitted from Obie and Miss Lynne's weekly visits.

I was able to connect different reading skills to Obie and Miss Lynne, such as creating <u>Obie Idioms</u> and <u>A Day in the Life of Obie</u> focusing on first person point of view. The students really gained a better understanding of each skill by connecting their writing assignments to Obie and Miss Lynne.

The class also did some research on Bassett Hounds so they had a better understanding of Obie and his characteristics. Then the students had to compare and contrast a Basset Hound to another breed of dog. This was a very informative lesson. The students were able to connect what they learned and turn it into a writing assignment." (JW – Quarry Hill Elementary, Pennsbury)

- ** "Students have become very confident reading orally. Their personal gains are a direct result from the relationship shared with Darcie and Juliet. The students are so excited to read when Darcie and Juliet come to class that I can barely contain them! Michelle is very encouraging and kind, providing reading support in a non-instructive way. The love and relaxed feeling they have with Darcie and Juliet allows learning barriers to fade and the fluent reading to prevail." (NR Lower Elementary, New Hope Solebury School District)
- ** "Nan and her dogs have had such a positive impact on my students. One of my students has a very difficult time with speech. Nan encourages him to speak to the dogs to give commands or greetings. Because of this, I have seen an increase in his verbalization. This year I invited a group of students who were having behavior issues in their regular education classes to join us for our therapy dog sessions. Using Jillian as an example, we had a great lesson on non-verbal cues to help them understand when they were frustrating others around them. We all look forward to our therapy dog days!" Students have had opportunities to practice reading fluency, conversation, and social skills when interacting with Judy and Casey.
