Editor's Note: The Nor'wester organization extends their heartfelt condolences to the Huttner family on the passing of Wes. He has left an amazing legacy, and Wendi's friend, Julie Sturman, kindly shared her thoughts about Wes and his indomitable presence.

From the moment Wes stepped off the plane from Wales, we knew he was a very special Labrador Retriever. Outgoing, friendly, and eminently biddable, he was the calmest and most laid back puppy we had ever seen.

Champion Balrion Weathertop Nor'wester, named for his father, El Nino, sailed through his AKC championship and earned his AKC Canine Good Citizen title and the THDD (Therapy Dog Distinguished) certificate as well.

His owner, Wendi Huttner, a long-time Labrador breeder whose children are both grown, had heard about reading dogs. These very patient, kind canines go into schools and libraries where, as non-judgmental audiences, they inspire children to gain confidence and love reading, a passion that will serve them well throughout life.

At first, the school administrators were reluctant - a dog in school? Allergies? Parent objections? But Wes changed all that as he charmed one and all and obligingly wagged his tail as each child read to him, showed him the pictures, smelled his fur, observed his anatomy, climbed on him, and literally used him as not only a reading aid but as an old and very reliable friend.

The remarkable thing about Wes was that not only did he do reading therapy, but as the pilot dog for the *Nor'wester Readers* organization, he inspired teachers, children, school board members, administrators, and other volunteers with therapy dogs to develop an evergrowing reading program in the Council Rock School District in Bucks County, PA.



Because of Wes's success, many children have become avid and competent readers, writers, illustrators, and learners. They look forward to and enjoy an activity that is often uninspiring for them to say the least.

Nor'wester Readers, renamed
Nor'wester Therapy Dogs in 2016, is now in
its tenth year of providing therapy dog services, and their pilot dog, Wes, made it all
possible. Had he been less of a dog, there
might have been only one class and one semester. Because of him and him alone, Council Rock and eight other districts, plus two
public libraries participate in the program he
started. Countless children will continue to
reap benefits beyond

KUDOS TO KIM SECTER AND PIPER!

Editor's Note: After seeing NWR volunteer Kim Secter do an amazing agility run televised from Westminster, we asked her to share more about her dog Piper and her Westminster experience. Kim volunteers for NWR with Piper's dam, Ranger, at Lower Elementary in the New Hope Solebury School District. They support the Title I reading program with weekly visits. NWR congratulates Kim and Piper on their 4th place and wish them lots of luck in Georgia.

Although not completely "Therapy Dog" related, I have to brag about Piper, who competed at the Westminster Agility Master Championship on Friday, February 10th. We qualified in both preliminary rounds, which earned us a coveted spot at the top of the heap and an appearance in the finals that was broadcast on Fox Sports on Saturday Feb. 12th.

Piper and I ended up finishing in 4th Place out of 99 dogs in the 20" jump height. Never in my wildest dreams!

Agility is a very fast, fun sport that requires incredible team-work with your dog. The team-work part is not unlike what we do with our therapy dogs.

Ranger, my therapy dog, is a retired High Level Agility Dog with 6 MACH's Master Championship titles to her credit along with advanced Obedience and Hunting titles. I bred Ranger one time to keep a puppy. She had 10 chocolate Lab pups, and we kept the smallest girl from that breeding. That puppy is our little Piper who is now 5 years old and following in her amazing dam's paw prints.

Piper just finished her MACH 4 and will be heading down to Perry, GA next month for the AKC National Championship. Ranger will be coming along as her cheering section!



Thank you to Jean and Kathy Morrison, owner of the bookshop, for their thoughtfulness in designating NWR as the recipient of their donation.




NOR'WESTER THERAPY DOGS 'GO FUND ME' CAMPAIGN


⇒ CREATIVE TEACHING IDEAS <</p>

to use with a therapy dog team

Editor's Note: I am doing therapy dog visits with my Labs Hannah and Heidi to Tanya' Mahon's autistic support class (gr 3-5) at William Davis Elementary School in Centennial School District. I asked her if I could share two teaching lessons she designed around the presence of a therapy dog. The Nor'wester organization strongly encourages teachers to think of their therapy dog team as a "teaching tool" to be used to help meet academic and instructional goals. I want to take this opportunity to remind our teachers and handlers that we LOVE hearing about successful lessons where the magic of the therapy dog made a difference. By sharing, everyone benefits! Copies of handouts or blurbs describing lessons along with photographs are always appreciated. COMPARE AND CONTRAST: VENN DIAGRAM


Tanya began class by reading the story <u>Officer</u> <u>Buckle and Gloria</u> by Peggy Rathman to her students. Her goals included listening skills, literature appreciation, compare and contrast, and learning to use a Venn diagram. After the story was over, Tanya asked each child to label the 3 sections of the diagram. Hannah was left circle portion, Gloria was the right portion, and the center overlap represented how both dogs were the same. They then had a discussion about the "differences" between Hannah and Gloria, recording the specific differences in the corresponding circle portions. For example, Gloria is a po-



lice dog and Hannah is a therapy dog. Gloria was a German Shepherd and Hannah is a Labrador Retriever. Some of the similarities the children identified were that both dogs had a job and both were girls. It was amazing how the presence of a live dog really made the lesson come "alive!"

MEASURING

Using the book <u>Measuring Penny</u> by Loreen Leedy, Tanya set forth the goals of listening skills, literature appreciation, following directions, interpreting measurement in a variety of ways, and



recording the findings. This lesson took 2 weeks, and the second week incorporated compare and contrast since Hannah visited the second week. In the story, Lisa has an important homework assignment-- to measure something in several different ways. She has to use standard units like inches/centimeters and nonstandard units like paper clips to find out height, width, length, weight, volume, temperature, and time. Lisa decides to measure her dog, Penny, and finds out ... Penny's nose = 1 inch long Penny's tail = 1 dog biscuit long, and Penny's paw print = 3 centimeters wide ... and that was only the beginning! Lisa learns a lot about her dog and about measuring, and even has fun doing it. The students measured both Heidi (week 1) and Hannah the following week with inches, centimeters, Lego blocks, paper clips, and magic markers to find out how long their ears, legs, tails were and how tall each one was. They had lots of fun comparing and contrasting the differences between Heidi and Hannah.
